A City of London Walk Between Tower Hill and Monument 1 July and 10 July

Although many people will be familiar with this area, the walk includes the famous sites as well as some unusual destinations hidden away in this part of the City. The walk will include a 'visit' to a closed Underground Station.

The walk will last approximately 2 hours and for the most part consists of easy and level walking apart from three sets of steps. The walk will start and finish at Tower Hill. It will be led by John King who – although he is not a professional guide – was a teacher of Geography and History in a local school and has led many different group walks in the City and other areas of London.

Refreshment stops are not included. At the end of the walk there are plenty of eating places available in the area around Tower Hill and towards Fenchurch Street.

Guided Walk Through Middle Temple and Embankment Gardens 8 and 13 July

Join U3A member Stewart Keating for a guided walk round the Middle Temple and Embankment Gardens.

We meet at Waterloo at 10.15, and travel by bus to Fleet Street. We pop into Lloyds Bank to look at the décor before walking through Middle Temple to Middle Temple Hall, where we have coffee and biscuits in the gallery, followed by a guided tour of this historic Tudor building.

We continue our walk through Middle Temple learning about some of the buildings and grounds, before heading off to the Embankment. We walk through Embankment Gardens, learning a little about the 20 or so statues and monuments erected mainly by our Victorians forefathers.

The walk should end at about 1.30 pm at Embankment Tube Station.

Visit to Knebworth House 2 September

One of England's most beloved stately homes, Knebworth House is famous worldwide for its rock concerts and as the home of Victorian novelist Edward Bulwer Lytton. This beautiful gothic mansion is situated in an enormous park 29 miles north of London.

The romantic exterior of the house with its turrets, domes and gargoyles silhouetted against the sky does little to prepare the visitor for what to expect inside. The house has stood for many years longer than the Victorian decoration suggests, and the stucco hides from view a red brick house dating back to the Tudor times.

Every generation of the Lytton family has left something of its style and taste, making Knebworth House an extraordinary walk through 500 years of British history. Stories and heirlooms

reflect the family's contribution to literature, politics and foreign service as well as to visits by characters as diverse as Charles Dickens, Winston Churchill and Noel Gallagher.

On arrival at the House we are offered tea/coffee and home-made biscuits before starting a guided house tour in small groups. The house tour will last approx. an hour. We can then buy lunch in the refectory. Light lunches are available from £6.00 upwards. After lunch we have time to stroll in the garden before taking refreshments and then starting our homeward journey at approx. 3.30 p.m.

Cost: £35.50 includes transport, tip, guided tour of the house and refreshments, but not lunch.

Cruise on the Danube

12th – 19th April 2015

Day 1: Off we went, all 32 travellers, for the next eight days, flying to Salzburg, then by coach to Passau where we boarded our cruise ship 'MS Serenity'. Its location is where the three rivers, the Danube, the Inn and the Ilz meet. Safely on board we met the crew and the other travellers (about 100).

Day 2: We sailed towards Melk where we disembarked to visit the Benedictine Abbey in the picturesque Wachau Valley in Austria. The Abbey is magnificent.

Day 3: We sailed on to Vienna for the next stop. We visited this beautiful city with its diverse architecture of palaces, castles and churches in Baroque, Roman and Art Deco styles. The weather so far had been good which made sightseeing a joy. In lovely sunshine we moved on to the magnificent Schönbrunn Palace where the guide showed us just some of its 1441 splendid rooms!

We could have spent a whole day in these beautiful surroundings without getting bored.

Day 4: Overnight we sailed towards Budapest which is said to be the most beautiful city in the world. On our city tour we understood why it has this reputation. The architecture of the Parliament building, Heros Square,

Fisherman's Bastion etc. etc. is stunning. Our boat was moored directly opposite the Parliament building and those who had their cabin on the right side could enjoy the splendid view even from the boat. In the evening we enjoyed a coach trip to see the town by night (it is magical) and then attended a musical evening with folk dancing while tasting the local wine and traditional Goulash soup. It was lots of fun and two of our group were even invited onto the stage to partake in the dancing.

Day 5: In glorious weather we visited a Puszta Farm, a traditional horse farm. After a welcome drink we were invited to a horse show where humans and horses showed their skills. After the show we all enjoyed a ride through the woods in horse-drawn carriages.

Day 6: Overnight we sailed towards Bratislava. Though a chilly day we didn't want to miss a guided walking tour through the town. We visited the museum and the impressive St. Martin's Cathedral. Again it is a beautiful city on the Danube which we were free to explore further in the afternoon before sailing towards



Dürnstein in the evening. Most managed to get on board before the rain arrived.

Day 7: This morning we joined a walking tour through Dürnstein, a small town with cobbled streets, pretty courtyards and the most beautiful view of the surrounding area. In between we tasted some more wine in one of the Wachau Valley's renowned wine cellars. Back on board in the evening we then enjoyed the Captain's farewell drink followed by the Captain's dinner while sailing back to Passau.

Day 8: We disembarked this morning to drive back to Salzburg Airport. Austria said 'goodbye' by showing us yet another beautiful part of its countryside. The journey by coach took us through green fields and charming little villages with quaint little houses set against the blue sky with bright sunshine and a row of snow covered mountains in the background. A fantastic picture!

The Impact of WW1 on
Surbiton
Shared Learning Project

Some members of Kingston U3A have recently been involved in a Shared Learning Project in collaboration with Hillcroft College, looking at the impact of the First World War on the residents of Surbiton. Some of the areas we researched included the Armed Forces, Belgian refugees, Belgian soldiers, the sinking of the Lusitania, enemy aliens, voluntary organisations and charities, medical care and hospitals, the changing expectations of women as well as food shortages and rationing. An enormous amount of information was gathered and a presentation of some of the results was given at Hillcroft in April.

The work was very rewarding and it is clear that there is still much more that can be done to tell the story of

Surbiton's experience during the War. Hillcroft has successfully applied for a Heritage Lottery Grant which will allow further research and will mean that the results can be made available to the wider public in Surbiton and Kingston. If you have family memories or even

objects relating to WWI in Surbiton, the team would love to hear from you. It is planned to continue the work later in the year and further volunteers would be very welcome. If you are interested, please contact Jennifer Anning
