Transports of Delight Around London by road, rail, river and air

**Wednesday 12th October and
Tuesday 18th October**

U3A members Sheila Evans and Claire Bletcher will be leading the round trip from Waterloo to the O2 Arena by bus, DLR, cable car and Riverbus on 12th and 18th October. We will travel by public transport, but the cable car and riverboat cost about £3.50 each with an Oystercard/Freedom Pass, and a bit more without.

We go by bus to the Tower of London where we visit the Timeline and Sundial before having a coffee break at the Minorities pub. We then take the DLR to Royal Victoria, and go via the cable car to the O2 Arena, where we stop for lunch in whichever of the 30 or so eateries takes your fancy. After lunch (and an optional visit to the free Sky Studios), we take the Riverbus for the return 40 minute journey back to Waterloo.

There are steps from Waterloo station to the York Road bus stop at the beginning and end of our trip and steps up to the Timeline, but the rest of the journey is on the flat or has escalators/lifts.

British Museum and the Sunken Cities Exhibition

Wednesday 9th November

A day at the British Museum combining a visit to the exhibition *Sunken Cities: Egypt's Lost Worlds*, plus a Blue-Badge-guided galleries tour (*Lost & Found*) highlighting little known treasures of the Museum's collection.

We meet our BB Guide in the Museum's Great Court, and after a brief introduction, we will be divided into two groups. One group will visit ***Sunken Cities*** and the other will enjoy the ***Lost & Found*** tour. After lunch, the groups swap activities. The rest of the day is free for you to do as you wish, before you make your own way back home. The Museum closes at 5.30 pm.

Sunken cities Over 1,200 years ago, two cities sank into the Nile Delta. Now, thanks to an amazing underwater excavation, we have the chance to get up close with some remarkable artefacts. The exhibition opens with a stunning 5m tall statue of the river god Hapi, and it doesn't let up from there. Each item includes a picture of it in situ on the sea bed, with divers next to it.



Lost & found From the Great Court at the heart of the greatest museum in the world we slip away from the crowds. Without walking you too far, our BB

Guide will take us to discover some of the lesser known treasures of the collection. The tour lasts just over an hour, and is light on the feet but very rich on the senses. Each gallery has some seating for those who would like to rest.

River Douro Cruise

8 - day cruise – 14th - 21st June 2017

In a sun-drenched corner of Europe the Douro has created a spectacular valley as it wends its way from Spain across Portugal to meet the Atlantic Ocean. It is

here in the colourful city of Porto that we join our ship and set off through miles and miles of rural scenery swathed with endless rows of neatly terraced vineyards and clusters of almond and olive trees, with tiny villages dotted here and there along the steep slopes.

On reaching Spain we turn our course back to Porto to explore the place that gave Portugal – and port wine – its very name. With sightseeing opportunities each day and the chance to experience local traditions aboard our ship, it is a summertime cruise that will lull you into the relaxing rhythm of the Douro, the river of gold.

Day 1: We fly from Gatwick to Porto and are transferred to Vila Nova de Gaia where we board our ship.

Day 2: We sail from Vila Nova de Gaia to Pinhão and in the afternoon pay an optional visit (€38.00) to Lamega, an elegant city filled with Renaissance and baroque mansions. We return to the ship and in the evening undertake another optional excursion (€48.00) to the little village of Favaio, at Quinta Aversada, where we enjoy wine tasting and dinner with live entertainment.



Day 3: After a leisurely morning there is an optional visit (€35.00) to Castelo Rodrigo which ranks among 12 historic villages in Portugal and has landmark status. Here you can admire the

medieval treasures and panoramic views. This evening the captain joins us for dinner.

Day 4: We sail from Vega de Terrón to Barca d'Alva and pay an optional visit (€85.00) to the Spanish city of Salamanca where you can enjoy lunch and a flamenco show. A traditional barbecue on board is planned for this evening.



Day 5: We relax on board this morning while sailing to Cais Espinho where we pay an optional afternoon visit (€50.00) to the Quinta do Seixo winery and the Mateus Castle and garden near Vila Real before joining the ship again in Régua. A folk show takes place this evening.

Day 6: In Régua we have an optional visit (€20.00) to the Douro Museum, a fantastic representation of the history of the Douro wine region, the first protected wine growing region on earth. In the evening we enjoy a sunset harbour cruise with traditional fado music on board our ship.

Day 7: Our optional excursion (€45.00) this morning explores Porto's secrets, leading you from the historic square to the waterfront and then to a local port winery for a tour and tasting. In the afternoon we have the option (€41.00) to explore Guimaraes, culture city of Europa in 2012 and often referred to

as Portugal's birthplace with its medieval houses and an old castle complex set against the deep green hills surrounding the Pena Palace.

Day 8: After breakfast we say goodbye to the team on board our ship and head to the airport for our return flight to London and coach transfer to our original pick-up points.

Our ship: Douro Sprit is a new 4* vessel of modern design with a lift between the lower and upper deck. All standard cabins have floor to ceiling French balconies, en suite shower, air conditioning, hairdryer, safe and TV. From the sun deck and the lounge bar you can enjoy a drink and the splendid scenery passing by. The restaurant serves delicious international cuisine as well as special diets - (vegetarian, gluten-free etc.). There is also a 24-hour self service station for tea and coffee.

The Beautiful Lake District

17th – 21st September 2017

Day 1: We board our Executive coach at the four pick-up points in the Kingston area and make our journey north for our lunch stop at Moseley Old Hall (NT) – an atmospheric Elizabethan farmhouse that saved a King. Find out about the dramatic story of King Charles II hiding from Cromwell's troops after he fled the Battle of Worcester in 1651. After lunch we continue to Cumbria where we check into our 3* AA Cumbria Grand Hotel at Grange over Sands for four nights on half-board basis.

Day 2: Today is dedicated to a guided tour of the stunning Lake District. We will visit many areas of outstanding beauty and small villages, steeped in character and history: Hawkshead and Beatrix Potter Gallery (NT) and Hilltop (NT), Beatrix Potter's 17th century farmhouse, Grasmere and 400 year

old Dove Cottage, once home of the famous poet William Wordsworth.

Day 3: This morning we will board the Windermere Lake Cruise for a 40 minute cruise to Bowness. After lunch we visit Holker Hall & Gardens, the family home of Lord and Lady Cavendish. This is a delightful family home with fine displays of antique furniture and art.



Day 4: Today we start by visiting Kendal with its many historical buildings, castles, bridges and a street market on a Wednesday. In the afternoon we visit Sizergh Castle and Gardens (NT).

Day 5: This morning we check out of the hotel and on our way home we stop at Leighton Hall. Stepping inside this house is like taking a step back in time, but it still retains the atmosphere of a family home. An enthusiastic guide will reveal the Gillow Reynolds' family history and habits. Each room from the Gothic Hall to the principle bedroom and the charming library has some interesting secret to reveal or tale to tell. Why is there a lock of James II's hair in the Drawing room, and why is the table in the hall shaped like a daisy? A light lunch is included here before we retrace our steps homeward.

Our Holiday In North Yorkshire

On April 24th 37 of our members set off for Skipton and a return to winter!

We enjoyed a comfortable coach journey, with hot and cold drinks served in transit, and an interesting lunch stop at Calke Abbey – a largely

un-restored house crammed with the eccentric collections of previous owners.

Our base for the week was the welcoming Rendezvous Hotel outside Skipton, next to the Leeds-Liverpool canal, and with a pleasant view of the Dales from the dining room.

On our first full day, Monday, we relaxed on a short narrow-boat trip to the centre of the attractive town where our guide led us to Skipton Castle. There we discovered the fascinating history of the Clifford family's medieval stronghold. The afternoon was taken up with a drive through lovely scenery to Howarth and the Bronte Parsonage. We got a very strong impression of how cold and bleak it must have been in the winter but the house itself was cosy, with an excellent collection in the museum giving a unique insight into the lives and interests of the Bronte family.



Ripley Castle

Tuesday dawned cold and wintry but we were soon to get used to this weather as we headed to Ripley Castle.

This was a wonderful place, continuously occupied by the Ingilby family for 700 years and sitting in the centre of a French-inspired model village. Lunch was taken in Harrogate, with pubs and cafes offering a welcome shelter from the hail and sleet, then on to RHS Harlow Carr. There was much to explore there but the weather drove many of us to spend most of our time in Betty's tearoom!



Wednesday was given over to a whole day in York. Luckily the weather held for the two hour guided walking tour of this beautiful city, and we discovered many sites and buildings that we might not have found without our guides – notably the Assembly Rooms, now an Italian Restaurant, and the roman walls and ruined Abbey. As the hail began to pelt down we once again found shelter in restaurants and cafes.

By Thursday the tops of the Dales were snow covered and looking very beautiful as we drove to Settle to join the train to Appleby. Settle station itself was worth the visit and the hour long journey took us through the remote Dales and over the Ribbleshead viaduct. The scenery was awe-inspiring in the rare sunshine, with the snow glistening on the summits

of the Three Peaks. Our coach met us at Appleby, a pretty little town, and we drove on to Hawes, through the picturesque "hidden valley" of the river Eden. Our coach driver was extremely skilful in negotiating the winding roads and narrow bridges and David, our guide, was very entertaining and also an expert on sheep breeds. He gave us many interesting facts about the geology of the area, dry stone walling and barn repair. Should we wish to become sheep farmers I think we now have all the information we need.

Lunch was taken at the Wensleydale Creamery and the coach was well stocked with cheese on our return journey, with a stop for a delicious cream tea in the attractive village of Grassington. We might have spent more time exploring there but the weather had closed in again, so it was off to the hotel and a welcome final supper.

We were sorry to leave the beauty of the Dales but our final treat was to be the lunch stop on our way home – the magnificent Chatsworth House. We had enough time to explore the impressive state rooms and admire the collections of porcelain and sculptures before the last leg of our drive back to Kingston. The whole week was a wonderful chance to experience a different part of England and to see it in all weathers. It certainly made me appreciate how tough the sheep and the farmers have to be to survive in the Dales and opened my eyes to new and interesting attractions.
