# Research project: Developing enjoyable audio resources for museums and galleries

Researchers at the University of Westminster, in collaboration with the Museum of London, are looking for participants to take part in a two-part study. They are looking at experiences of recorded audio for a series of photos taken from the collections of the Museum of London. They are interested in all perspectives – whether you visit museums often or never; whether or not you frequently use audio facilities in museums. Your participation will contribute to the development of our understanding about what makes successful audio resources, and about their potential for use more widely across the museum sector.

#### What you will need to do

You will be shown eight photographs on a laptop screen and asked to listen to the audio through headphones. Afterwards, you will be asked questions about your thoughts and experience. This should take about an hour. One month later, we will ask you to complete a follow-up questionnaire to fill in at home, again asking about your thoughts and experiences. It should take you about 20 minutes to complete. We will offer you a £15 Amazon voucher upon completion to thank you for your participation.

### Where and when?

The first part of the study will take place at the University of Westminster, 115 New Cavendish Street, London, W1W 6UW (nearest Tube station is Goodge Street). The questionnaire will be emailed to you. We have dates available to reserve now.

## Kingston U3A: Booking speakers for our monthly meetings

We are still looking for one or two people to take on the role of Speakers Secretary and are hoping that the details below may encourage one or two volunteers to come forward and offer their services.

Booking speakers is not very difficult or time-consuming and there is a huge list of possible speakers available to choose from.

Here's what's involved:

- Identify the date of each monthly meeting. This is usually the first Monday of each month but, where a Bank Holiday falls on the first Monday, you will need to move the meeting to the following week.
- Book the hall at the United Reformed Church for the 12 meeting dates.
- Find a speaker for eleven of the meetings (the January meeting is always the annual quiz). There's a list of a variety of possible candidates. Pencil in some likely candidates.
- Email/Phone and invite selected speakers, offer dates and find out the sort of fee they might expect. Our maximum payment is £150 but many speakers will accept less.
- Keep a note of their email addresses and phone numbers and find out what equipment, if any, they need for their talk.
- Select the title of the talk (many speakers have several subjects on offer) and fill in the plan for the year.
- Let the newsletter editor and the committee have your list of speakers.
- Email the selected speakers with a definite booking, giving details of the date, time and venue. We also have an 'Advice for Speakers' sheet.

- Follow this up a couple of weeks before the day and check all is well. Get a mobile number and give yours in case of last minute problems.
- Arrange with Diane Wilson to be on hand if the speaker has asked for equipment.
- Ask the Treasurer to have a cheque ready to pay the speaker on the day.
- Meet and greet the speaker on the day and take care of them.

Most of the speakers for 2019 are already booked but we need to make a start as soon as possible for the 2020 programme. If we can't find volunteers to take on these tasks, our Monday meetings will have to be suspended. So, if you are interested, please contact Susan Hinchsliffe at communications@kingstonu3a.org.uk.
