Research into Alzheimer's

A research team at University College London (UCL) is conducting a study funded by Alzheimer's Research UK. It aims to learn more about how people navigate and, specifically, how their ability to do so declines with age. The team is looking for older volunteers to participate in their study.

What you'll have to do

- Play a few levels of a mobile app game (Sea Hero Quest) at the Department of Psychology and Language Sciences, UCL.
- Walk round Covent Garden with an experimenter, where you will be asked to find various locations in a scavenger-hunt-like task.
- Use your best compass skills to point back to locations you have passed during the walk.

Dates: There are several time slots (9am-5pm) on the following Tuesdays – 19 March, 26 March, 2 April

Place: Meet at the Department of Psychology and Language Sciences (UCL), 26 Bedford Way, London, WC1H 0AP, followed by a walk to and around Covent Garden

Duration: 2-2.5 hours (20-30 minutes at Bedford Way, 40-50 minutes' walking, including 10 minutes' walk from Bedford Way to Covent Garden)

Compensation: £7.50 an hour. Refreshments will be provided.

King's College London: recruitment of volunteers for clinical trials

We advertised this clinical trial in the September news bulletin last year but Curie Kim and the ChANgE study team at King's College London are still looking for volunteers to take part in a study investigating the effects of intermittent fasting (5:2 diet) and/or chewing on the production of new brain cells, ageing and memory.

Requirements

You need to fulfil the following criteria:

- Be 60+ years old.
- Have a BMI 25-35kg/m2.
- Do not usually chew more than three pieces of gum in a week.
- Do not already follow an intermittent fasting regime.

What you will have to do

- Answer questions about your health, initially via telephone or email (5-10 minutes).
- Attend the Metabolic Research Unit of the Department of Nutritional Sciences (Corridor A, 4th Floor Franklin-Wilkins Building, Waterloo campus, King's College London) for a screening visit (approximately 1 hour).
- If you fit the study criteria, make a further three study visits (1 hour) over a 12week period. You will be asked to provide fasting blood samples, fill in questionnaires and complete a computer-based task.

Compensation: £75 for your time and up to £10 travel expenses per visit upon successful completion of the study.
