New Postage Stamps: A Reminder

The Royal Mail is adding a barcode to all its regular 'everyday' stamps. You can see a picture of this on the Royal Mail's website.

Any non-barcoded stamps you already have will remain valid until 31 January 2023 but please be aware that, if you aren't able to use all of your stamps by that date, you can swap them out for new barcoded ones.

However, this isn't as easy as just handing them in at a post office. You have to fill in a Stamp Swap Out Form and submit it to the Royal Mail with your non-barcoded stamps. You can still submit any stamps you think you will be unable to use by the January 2023 deadline.

These arrangements do **not** apply to special stamps with pictures on them and Christmas stamps: these will remain valid even though they have no barcode.
