Great British Eccentrics and Rogues – Paul Robbins

Paul's talk looks at some of the world's great eccentrics and rogues who just happened to be British – like the lord who spent many hours floating in a large indoor glass water tank writing rude letters to the Prime Minister; a comically UFO-obsessed peer; and some more modern world-famous characters whom you will recognise.

Monday 15 May, 2pm

The Foundling Museum – Volunteer guide from the museum

The talk covers the history of the Foundling Hospital, the UK's first children's charity and public art gallery, and its founder, Thomas Coram. It describes the admissions system; the use of tokens for identity; and the involvement of contemporary artists including Hogarth, Reynolds and Gainsborough, and the major benefactor, Handel.

The Sunbury Embroidery Gallery – Robert Shaw

Robert, architect and chairman of Sunbury Gallery, will talk about the creation of the Sunbury Millennium Embroidery, from its inception in 1995 to the opening in 2006, including its ethos, a royal visit, outreach and exhibitions, the Diane Springhall collection and plans for the future.
